- Be active within New Zealand Red Cross to remain updated on all issues, queries, events, and activities that may affect Māori.



The rōpū is open to anyone committed to upholding Māori aspirations, where all members can contribute at the level that suits their skills, time, capacity, and desire.

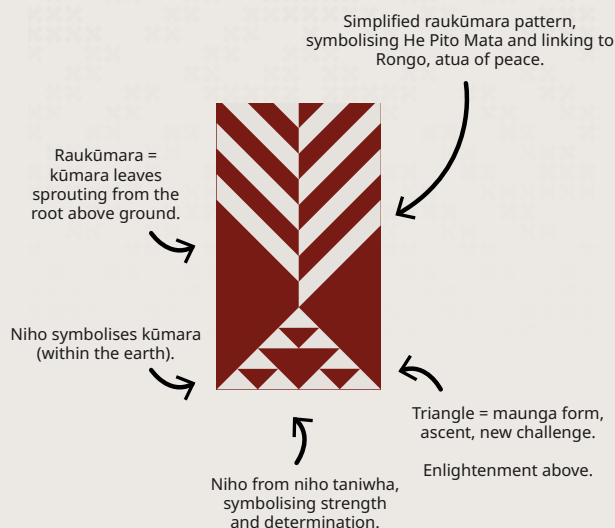

In English a tohu can be defined as a 'sign' or 'symbol'. Our tohu, reflects our commitment to working with Māori as tangata whenua and incorporates he pito mata acknowledging the new challenge and strength and determination as you embark on your cultural haerenga.

Online knowledge check

As mentioned at the front of the rauemi, we all need to improve our awareness and understanding of te ao Māori so we can better connect with Māori in our communities.

To leave you feeling like you have progressed in your awareness and understanding of te ao Māori, we have put together a knowledge check which is available for all our people.

The knowledge check comprises of 20 multi-choice questions. The questions cover

- Organisational knowledge
- Te Tiriti o Waitangi
- Tikanga and Kawa
- Engaging with Māori

Once you have completed and passed the knowledge check, you will be sent a tohu recognising your progression in your cultural education and commitment to working with Māori as tangata whenua.
